What a year! When I accepted the role of Headteacher in November, I knew it would be challenging and that we needed to implement many changes and make some difficult decisions, but I did not appreciate how rewarding being the Head of this school would be and continues to be.

Five months into my leadership role and OFSTED came to complete a full inspection. That process was so positive, and we were graded good, which was such a boost and a well-deserved decision for all our wonderful students and our amazing staff.

There has been significant investment in both sites, with learning spaces at the farm (in the guise of cabins) and outdoor works being agreed for the Ark to transform the play area outside.

Over the Summer break there will be further significant changes on both sites, with improvements to the Ark building (new windows, carpets etc) and further cabins for new students at the farm. The farm will be divided into Middle School (The Orchard) and Secondary area (The Farm), as we recognise that our younger students need safer spaces at the farm to learn.

There will be further development of outside areas at the farm with a MUGA and PE field to allow our students more physical activity alongside the fantastic animal care provision we provide.

We have focused on recruitment this year, with the appointment of qualified teaching staff who have specialist skills to work with students with complex needs. We have also focused on quality of education, which was commented on by OFSTED, and all our students are now consistently sitting assessments for CORE. This year we have had the best exam results we have ever had, which is a testament to our staff who work so incredibly hard to improve students' life outcomes and the hard work students put into their learning and progress. Our school is evolving and improving all the time.

We sadly say goodbye to two members of SLT this term, Mark and Leah, two members of staff who have contributed hugely to our school over the last 3 years and we wish them the best of luck in their new endeavours. We also said goodbye to our year 11's who have all been offered college placements and we wish them the best of luck with their future careers.







We have appointed a new Deputy Head Ben Coombes who has already proved to be an excellent team player and addition to our team and other key staff leading subjects such as Reading/Phonics, new Thrive and I and E leads, new Art teachers on both sites and our robust CPD programme ensures we have a number of staff who are on courses to improve their professional development.

We have also run our first residential trip this year with the Outdoor Education Team planning and preparing for this trip, allowing our young people to have an amazing experience on the river Wye.

Our farm has undergone some significantly positive improvements, with the appointment of our new farm manger Nikki, who has made improvements to animal welfare and the environment with new fencing, field care and farm building clear up. The farm is looking incredible, and the team deserve the accolade for all their hard work.

In Summer 2 we were awarded the Ambassador Excellent school award, for Leadership, relationship, environment, reparative and right time. This is a huge achievement, and again a testament to our Thrive Team and staff who underpin everything they do with the Thrive therapeutic approach.

We are ready for the new academic year in September and looking forward to welcoming our new and existing students onto site and continuing striving to be an outstanding school. I hope you all have a wonderful Summer!

Farm School Site News

What an amazing Year the farm has had this year. There has been much physical and emotional development and progress made by all the students at the farm as well as site development that better enhances the education we offer. After gaining the school's fabulous OFSTED results back at Easter, the students and staff have continued to drive progress and development forward. This summer term emphasises these success. I am really proud of all our young people at the farm and how they have grown, and thank the farm staff and parents/carers for their devotion and persistence in keeping the individuals in mind.

Exams

This term, students in Year's 10, 11 & 12 undertook and gained some amazing exam results in Functional skills Maths and English and for the first time in the school history we had groups of students sharing the same exam room (up to 4 in a room) and partaking jointly in the English speaking and listening exams. Previous cohorts of students have only accessed this 1:1. This reflects the huge steps students have made within their social develops and abilities to control anxiety, worry and fear, as well as their ability to converse and share with peers. It is therefore no wonder why this year we a very high number of leavers successfully moving onto and gaining placements in a variety of College's and none going NEET (Young people not in education, employment or training). It is of course with great sadness that these students are leaving us for their new and exciting opportunities and we as a school wish them well. Of our leavers we wish Felix, Lewis, Cameron, Kaden, Gwydion and Jayden the best of luck at college and congratulate them on securing placements - Brilliant. We also wish Bell and Maya good luck for their new schools as they now move to new locations. We celebrated all these success with our young people with a Farm wide assembly and leavers meal where we wished these students well.

Site & Staff

The farm site has been further developed throughout this summer term with works taking place to improve the quality and condition of the farm, its animals and grasslands. Nicola the farm manger has led and made these changes. The farm is now a safer, more organised, and cleaner environment and the animals are fitter for their health plans which they have been following since February. Site work has included movement of the Haystack, safety fencing installed around the hay bales/ silage bails and slurry pits areas. The 12-acre field has been cut and harvested for new hay, field rotation and hedge trim and pruning. The horses, Shetlands and goats have lost weight and we have had the arrival of our new Highland Cow. Other work has included the carpark resurfaced, a new DT (woodwork/ textiles) workshop with new glass fronting and new fixed machinery. Finally new fencing has been erected including around the carpark cabins for safety, new football grass pitch laid next to the round pen area behind the barns, and we have increased WiFi coverage around the farm site. Over the summer further developmental work is set to take place giving the farm a new feel in September. Further developmental work to improve facilities and site for our young people include:

- installing a new electronic entry gate on the drive reducing traffic speed and safety for our students,
- Car park extension,
- 2 more wooden class
- room cabins to increase teaching spaces,
- Fencing work enclosing zones for different student needs,
- A new DT kitchen with 4 individual workstations (4x cooker, 4x hobs, 4x fridges and 4x sinks) for independent home cooking lessons in a brand new room
- New Fibre optic cabling improving ICT facilities across the whole site.







In addition to the site developments we have also expanded the farm team this term, expanding our curriculum and delivery for our young people. Staff have settled in and built effective relationships with many of our young people and despite students finding changes and new people difficult, they have all overcome this and warmly welcomed; Beth Hart (Maths), Will O'Rourke (History/ Geography & RE), Tracey Brawn (LSW), Sarah Walton (Thrive Lead), Jemma Latham (I&E Lead), Lucy Febrey (LSW), RT-Rhianne Tyson (ART), Dominque Lab-run (Thrive) and Ben Combes (Deputy Headteacher). Next September will see new students arrive replacing those who have moved on. We offer them a warm welcome too. Many of these students will have already had transition days or started a transition plan to the farm allowing successful integration and building of relationships. Of these students we welcome- Aaron , Maia, Matt, Kai, Anthony, Tarlia, Shantayah, Elliott, Flo and Adara. To support new students, we also have extended our farm teaching team allowing us to offer more subjects and support for students. Finally joining us in the Autumn term of 2022 on the staff team will be; Mark Jessop (cover teacher), Barrie Davis (Food DT teacher) and Joanna (ESW) and Lucy (I and E ESW).

Social and emotional

Over this summer term, staff have really focused on student interactions and the social development. This has been facilitated using the Badminton court and football pitch through which student have shared, competed, challenged, and interacted in teams and groups. In addition to combined farm lessons, Outdoor Adventure, PE, and core lessons (Maths/ English/ Science/ PSHE). We have seen the fruits of this work being successful with many students extend their window of tolerance and being able to deal with the changes faced with or involved in social situations. To support students, staff run 'How to be a teenager' (PSHE session on Wednesday mornings which reinforces social aspects of relationships and interactions). The Thrive REPAIR-RELATE-RUPTURE CYCLE has been key in helping students understand and respond to this. Staff have been using the shine the light process to help them reflect, which is becoming more effective.

Students have also had to deal with losses in life this term (staff, peers and animals.) These losses can trigger similar feelings of trauma in children which can impact upon their resilience level and result in low self-esteem and negative mindset. All staff, especially tutors, Thrive practitioners and the intervention team are very mindful of this and will monitor and offer support to all students as needed in the coming terms.

It is key to help young people by telling them the story. To support this, we recently sent home a social story that explained the changes in staff, we ask that you put this on the fridge or go through this with your child several times including just before they return in September to remind them. Staff that are leaving include Leah Roberts (Leah is off to work in a new school undertaking a different role as Family Thrive liaison, She will be sorely missed), Dan Harper (changing roles to work for the YMCA with 16-25 year olds as a mentor, we wish him well and will miss him off the outreach programme) Harriet Rose (off to train in her PGCE teaching qualification at Baths University) We wish you all good luck! It is with great sadness I say goodbye as I am moving on to a new school closer to home.

Summary

When reflecting on the school, the farm, its students, and the development over my last 3.5 years of employment, it fills me with such a sense of pride the achievements the team have made. The schools' curriculum and delivery of education has gone from strength to strength allowing more students to access more awards and developing interests in new areas. We now offer a broader, more bespoke programme that covers more National Curriculum subjects. As a result, many more students now leave the school with more qualification compared with when I started. We now meet our school aim:

'An individualised education to improve life outcomes'.

This is demonstrated by more students going onto level 1 and 2 college courses (key reflector that socially developments have been massively improved). Therapeutically, students are helped and leave being better able to manage their emotional responses and appear to be more confident young people. The sites have benefited from new facilities with further developments set to extend our provision further. The school has increased staff that help expand delivery and allows the schools to better focus on meeting individual needs.





The school staff work hard, are dedicated to students and work relentlessly to meet their needs. It is their passion and genuine care that make Wessex Lodge so special and supportive. A key element within the process of success is the parental/ carer support. This is so vitally important for our young people and shows the adults work together. Your support is vital to helping students grow and progress. The atmosphere at the school is unique and highly supportive, I will miss this, students and staff. I have no doubt that the continuity and persistence of focus on the students will be upheld by Ben Coombes (my predecessor) who has already successfully started his role with Wessex at the Farm as lead, and under the continued leadership of the Principal Kate Stradling. I am therefore wish you all a kind farewell and good luck for the forth coming year and your futures.


Hello everyone,

I have now been in post for 3 months, seems like only yesterday when I started here at The Ark.

In my short time here, I can honestly say that this is a wonderful place, the staff care so much for the youngsters in their care and that is shown back in the appreciation from their students. There are great plans being implemented over the summer break and we trust that the young people will enjoy these changes.

It has been my pleasure to teach Maths and English to soe of the students and though not everyone has been fully accepting of the change of teacher we are all getting along well. Whilst we have concentrated on consolidating the work done so far we have worked on some of the more, shall I say interesting, areas of maths and English, and whilst not everyone has made a lot of progress all have made some.

As an example, we have recently been involving different students in our classes. We have spent time working on Algebra, Area, Perimeter and Volume. In outdoor Education at the end of the term I took groups of children over to Blue Circle Bowls Club in Westbury to try their hand at Lawn Bowls. They did amazingly well considering many have never seen bowls before and no-one had actually given it a go. I am pleased to say that the bowling club have invited us back to have another go from April next year.





Next year I hope to establish a GCSE Maths and English course which allows us to study for and gain Functional Skills awards as we go through the 2-year course. So far this year one student has sat external examinations and passed gaining his Entry level 3 qualification in Mathematics and English. I look forward to more results in the coming year.

Due to increasing pupil numbers, we have been forced to change the rooms for 2 of our groups, Tigers and Panthers are switching rooms. Students have been fully informed of the changes happening around the school and we plan to have changed the rooms around before the end of the term.

We are also having a lot of site work being done over the break and this includes new play area and new football area outside the office. I am hopeful that over the summer break a whole slew of works to the site will be taking place. We hope to be replacing all the windows, have a new domestic kitchen fitted for the staff and students to use, as well as redecorating the rooms. There is hope that Lizzie will move from her small office to what is currently the Library, the Library will move down to Lizzies room, and the front office will have a wall put up to generate an area of private space where management and staff can, if needed have discussions in private.

Thrive has moved from strength to strength within the school, within this summer term, the school became recognised and gaining the Thrive Ambassador Award (5 subcategory awards). This award makes us a flag ship school for new joining schools or those established now moving towards awards in Thrive. There are only a small number of schools in the UK who have this status and we are proud to join them. The achievement of this award is collective with all staff moving us forward and employing the therapeutic approaches, however this whole drive and innovative has been lead and driven by Leah Roberts and the Thrive team- amazing work and well done. Thankyou from our students who benefit the most. In essences, Thrive is embedded in all aspects of the school life and community, with all staff embracing and using the techniques and practices daily. This too has positively impacted upon our young people, and has helped them recognise emotions and feelings, learn control techniques, expand windows of tolerance, techniques to deal with Loss and conflict and by rebuild missing gaps in development stages. Through this process they are better equipped to remain in the middle of the developmental highway. This again is most evident in our leavers students who have mastered the social and emotional skill to be more resilient but also in many of our young people who are making quicker growth toward Pathway 2 (ready to learn). At the farm, through lots of work has been undertaken with students to get them to recognise their own success with reparative Thrive and the work by staff daily around their emotional and social needs. Well done to all the team and students who now embrace Thrive and helped to embed it.















This term in Chemistry we have been working on understanding "Atoms, Elements, and Compounds". We did some work understanding the subatomic particles that make up atoms. 
Pete has been enjoying his Music lessons with Tom and he has even bought a guitar!

As you read student reports you may see the acronym AFOREST but what does it mean?




SUMMER NEWSLETTER - ICT

EFL (Equine-Facilitated Learning)


This term the students and horses have all worked very hard; we have had some very hot days and some very pesky horse flies, so we have given our equines lots of baths this term.












Hello everyone!


Eric the kune kune pig continues to enjoy his paddock next to the goats, he snores the day away under his tree.....go give him a belly rub he will be your friend forever.








Art

techniques, creating animals with tissue paper and mark making techniques.




<u>Art and Photography 2022-2023</u>


