This platform enables staff to collect good quality evidence based on an individualised curriculum.

The Farm and Ark site continue to undergo a lot of work on the environment and the farm site has a newly appointed forest school area, with a Yurt already in place, and we are awaiting the installation of our garden room building in that area. Forest school continues to be very popular with students where they are learning valuable life skills such social skills, teamwork, improving listening skills, leadership, problem solving and hard skills such fire building, den building, survival, outdoor cooking, how to manage risk and adhere to health and safety procedures. When we return in the New year we have many projects scheduled for school environment improvements. We are committed to our school sites looking and being the best that they can be.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our hard-working staff who care so much about our students and always put them first. I wish the staff, all our students and their families and guardians a merry Christmas and peaceful New Year.

The Horticulture area is busily being prepared for the spring with beds cleared and covered ready for planting.

Students wise we are full to bursting with many students still on lists waiting to come. It is such a great privilege to be working with such a good group of young people. The growth we have seen this term has been marked. We have all shared some great highlights from students sitting external assessments, to some great written work, to Artwork, to Physical feats in the gym, to witnessing regular acts of kindness with some strong friendships being made across the site. 






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# English


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### Dragonflies








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An update you on the activities and progress made by the pupils in Physical Education this term. It has been an exciting term filled with various activities aimed at enhancing the pupils' physical fitness, promoting teamwork and cooperation, and introducing new and enjoyable games.

In the first half of the term, the focus was on Health-Related Fitness, weights, and cardiovascular fitness. The pupils had the opportunity to explore the new gym area, familiarizing themselves with the equipment including the frame, free weights, and Olympic bars. Emphasis was placed on safety aspects, and the pupils were encouraged to understand the importance of warm-up and cooling down routines. I am pleased to note that many pupils have taken responsibility for their fitness routines, with some even initiating their own sessions before school.





During the second half of the term, the focus shifted to indoor hall games including basketball, football, dodge ball, and handball. This allowed the pupils to further develop their teamwork and cooperation skills through small-sided games.





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In addition to the structured activities, new informal game rules were introduced during break and lunch to promote harmonious play and fun. Furthermore, I am excited to share that Pickleball, a cross between badminton and tennis, has been introduced and has been well received by both pupils and staff. This game has brought new challenges and is accessible for all abilities.



At the Ark this term in science the students have been planning and running experiments to find out answers to our hypothesis. On the farm we have been putting together a tropical fish tank which will hopefully get its first fish in after the Christmas break. We have done a survey on peoples nails at the farm and running some analysis on the data to find out what group of people bite their nails more or who spends the most money on their nails.

I am the new Home Cooking Skills teacher, and I am so excited to be back with Wessex Lodge School!!

As part of the Wessex Lodge School creative curriculum, my aim is to provide opportunities for pupils to learn to cook and apply the principles of health and nutrition provided by the government's Eat Well guideline. The course is based on the proposition that being able to cook is an essential life skill which will empower our young people to make changes that have benefits to long term wellbeing of self and family as well as achieving independence.


Within Home Cooking Skills we are encouraging our learners to develop the knowledge, understanding and confidence to cook meals at home. They will be gaining a good understanding on how to economies when planning a meal and develop the ability to transfer skills learned to different recipes. In this way the pupils will inspire others by transferring that knowledge, whilst at the same time gaining the confidence to cook. The course will also develop pupil awareness of different cultures, food safety and hygiene, motor skills and insecurity and look at changing food habits and make better choices.









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
